#### So the Referendum Passed ~ Now What?

The voters in Suffolk County have passed the Clean Water referendum this past November. That is fantastic news for our industry! The Clean Water legislation will provide a revolving revenue source for the grant program for homeowners to replace their aging cesspools and upgrade to an Innovative / Alternative On-site Wastewater Treatment System commonly referred to as I/A systems or Clean Water Septics. The program will ramp up the second quarter of 2025 after the sales tax increase goes into effect in March of 2025. Now is the time for you to complete the required training from each of the manufacturer's representatives of the currently approved clean water septic systems, and start accumulating the required Training Credit Hours. Training for the additional endorsement is easy. The Long Island Advanced Septic Association, Inc. has an on-line, on-demand program that is specifically about the clean water septics and how they work. This program has been approved by Suffolk County Consumer Affairs for 4 credit hours. Additionally, training for the clean water septics is also offered by the University of Rhode Island. Their course is an 8 hour in person program given several times each year.

Once you complete the required additional training and successfully add the endorsement # 10 to your Suffolk County Consumer Affairs license your company can then submit a quote through the Solicitation pf Quotes (SOQ) 23-30004 for the materials and labor for the installation of Innovative and Alternative On-site Wastewater Treatment Systems for the Septic Improvement Program (SIP) to set pricing for SIP grant funded I/A OWTS installations. Submitting this SOQ may make your company eligible to be listed on the Suffolk County SIP Approved Vendor List.

There is a lot of potential work ahead and plenty of work to go around for everyone. You have to take a few steps now to be able to participate in the program and serve the future customers who need to upgrade their cesspool or septic systems to an I/A OWTS.

#### **Preparing for Winter Operations**

As winter approaches, all truckers face unique challenges that come with harsh weather conditions. From icy roads to freezing temperatures, navigating the colder months requires preparation, vigilance, and resilience. Here's a comprehensive guide on how to prepare for winter to ensure safety, efficiency, and comfort during your work day.

#### WINTERIZE YOUR TRUCK

Ensuring your truck is ready for winter conditions is the first step in preparing for the season. Here's what you need to focus on:

Inspect Tires: Ensure your tires have adequate tread depth for

traction on icy roads. Consider using snow tires or carrying tire chains if we experience heavy snowfall. Check Fluids: Ensure all fluids, including antifreeze, engine oil, and windshield washer fluid, are appropriate for colder temperatures.

Know Your Route: Familiarize yourself with the route, including alternative roads in case of closures or detours. Use GPS with Traffic Updates: Opt for a GPS system that provides real-time traffic and weather updates. Only use GPS designed for Heavy Trucks!

Communicate Your Plans: Inform your dispatcher and loved ones about your planned route and expected arrival times.

#### DRIVE CAUTIOUSLY!

#### The Town of Huntington's Aquaculture Initiatives

This edition of the LINAP newsletter will focus on the Town of Huntington's aquaculture initiatives and how community collaboration can play a critical role in tackling local environmental challenges to achieve impactful results. It features an interview with Garrett Chelius, Deputy Director of the Department of Maritime Services, who provides insights into the town's efforts in areas such as oyster reef restoration and shell recycling.

Aquaculture is a method used to produce food and other commercial products, restore habitat and replenish wild stocks, and rebuild populations of threatened and endangered species. The Town of Huntington has proven to be a leader in aquaculture on Long Island.

Central to the Town's success is the Rotary Environmental Action Coalition of Huntington (REACH), a partnership between the Town of Huntington, Cornell Cooperative Extension, and Rotary International. REACH aims to address local environmental challenges through a range of water quality improvement projects. "REACH brings together the expertise of Cornell Cooperative Extension, the volunteer efforts of the Rotarians, and the resources of the Town of Huntington," said Garrett. By leveraging the combined strengths and networks of these organizations, REACH is able to foster a culture of environmental stewardship and drive significant change both within Huntington and beyond.

#### **Oyster Reef Restoration**

One of REACH's signature projects is the restoration of oyster reefs. Oyster reefs are an important ecosystem to Long Island. We all know that oysters are harvested to eat but, did you know they also clean the water by filtering it? Additionally, the way that oysters grow close together and form oyster reefs allow them to be used as habitat by many species of marine life. Oyster reefs also can reduce storm damage by decreasing wave energy, and erosion along shorelines.

Historically, oysters were abundant in the waters around Long Island and New York City. Overharvesting, water quality impairments, and pollution have caused a significant reduction in the population. Many municipalities, environmental groups, and other agencies are working hard to restore the oyster population and oyster reefs across Long Island and New York City. One method of restoration is known as the spat-on-shell method. In nature, oysters are broadcast spawners — meaning that eggs and sperm are released into the water column where fertilization occurs. After floating for a short time, oyster larvae seek a hard substrate to settle on. Once oyster larvae permanently attach to a surface, they are known as spat. The spat-on-shell approach is used to create oyster reefs, mimicking how reefs would form naturally in the wild.

The Town of Huntington uses the spat-on-shell approach, growing oysters specifically for reef restoration rather than consumption. The oysters are nurtured in Floating Upweller Systems (FLUPSYs), which are specialized nursery docks designed to culti-



vate shellfish until they reach a size suitable for planting in natural reefs. Cornell Cooperative Extension seeds the shells, and measures and maintains them during the summer months. The Rotary provides volunteers who work to clean the growing shells each week and the Town provides the facilities to house the FLUPSYs as well as the maritime vessels needed for this program.

The project has evolved from an initial focus on survival rates to a comprehensive reef-building effort. Northport Marina Woodbine and Gold Star Battalion Beach now host dedicated FLUPSYs for this work, with local yacht clubs also running related programs. "In the first two summers, we planted over 450,000 oysters in local bays," Garrett notes. "These reefs filter water and provide habitat for marine life. We've exceeded that number this year alone."


#### **Oyster Shell Recycling**


Another critical initiative is the Town's shell recycling program. This effort collects discarded oyster and clam shells from local

restaurants, cleans and cures them, and uses them as substrate or host shells for future oyster reefs. Volunteers collect the shells from participating restaurants and deposit them at the shell curing area. Once the shells have cured for nine months to remove all pathogens, as required by the Department of Environmental Conservation, they become substrate for oyster seedlings. "Since starting the program in May 2023, we've collected over 500 five-gallon buckets of shells," Garrett reports.

The shell recycling program is an important step in the Town's overall oyster reef building project. With this initiative, the Town of Huntington is now becoming a model, providing shell stock to other towns and cities to begin their own programs. "The success of the program has been remarkable," Garrett adds with pride. "We've now reached the point where we export shells to support other Long Island communities, becoming net exporters in the process."

With a new greenhouse and equipment donated by Lazy Point Farms and the Moore Foundation, the Town is now able to dry and process the kelp locally. "The first year, we took our harvested kelp to a farm for processing. But last year, Lazy Point Farms generously donated a greenhouse, allowing us to dry and process our kelp locally. Lazy Point Farms also donated a hammer mill machine, so we're going to try to make the kelp into a powder so it's even more concentrated," Garrett explains. Groundskeepers at several town parks and golf courses have expressed interest in using the kelp as a natural bio-stimulant and soil amendment.

The Town plans to expand this project with additional kelp lines in all of the Town's bays and harbors.

In addition to marine initiatives, Huntington is growing native plants to help restore and protect local habitats. For ten months of the year, when the greenhouse is not in use for drying the kelp, the focus will shift to propagating plant species native to Long Island to be planted on town property. "We're focusing on native plants that will help manage stormwater runoff and support local bee and butterfly populations," says Garrett. "These efforts are crucial for maintaining the health of our upland areas where stormwater runoff goes right into the harbor." The town plans to use the kelp as natural fertilizer to grow the natives and plant them at strategic locations throughout the town where stormwater runoff is problematic.



#### **Educating Huntington's Future Environmental Stewards**

The town is also expanding its educational outreach with the addition of two new outdoor classrooms at Gold Star Battalion Beach where one of the Town's FLUPSY is kept. This exciting development, funded by a grant from the Rotary and supported by Stony Brook University, represents a major step forward in providing hands-on, experiential learning opportunities. These outdoor classrooms will be designed to offer STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) education for students from kindergarten through 12th grade. By integrating the natural environment into the curriculum, the new facilities will enable students to engage with their studies in a

in a real-world context, fostering a deeper understanding of environmental science and sustainability. The initiative aims to inspire and educate the next generation of environmental stewards to continue to protect Huntington's marine







# New York 811 Excavation Training & Education Program

MANDATORY LAW CHANGE (Senate Bill S.6756 and Assembly Bill 9985)

On November 5, 2018, New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo signed Senate Bill S.6756 and Assembly Bill 9985 into Law with the intent to greatly reduce the number of excavation related accidents thereby providing greater public safety and protection. The amendment to NYS Code Rule 753 will require any municipality or operator that engages in excavation work to require its excavators to complete a training and education program from their local One Call Notification Center. Several times a year the licensing review board is approached by individuals who find themselves ill prepared to transition their company's licensing status to successor or alternate applicant, usually following the unexpected passing of a corporate officer or sole proprietor. LILWA and the Department of Labor, Licensing and Consumer Affairs urges all license holders to formulate and implement a contingency plan that will mitigate this burden for your dependents, heirs, and employees. We suggest you read through this PARTIAL list of requirements and assess how well prepared you are to identify a potential successor to your licensing needs.




#### LIQUID WASTE LICENSE INSTRUCTIONS

Commercial, Industrial, Residential, Septic Tank, Sewer Drain Treatment, Bacteria Additives & Maintenance Field

\*\*\*\*\* All applicants MUST be a Member/Officer/Owner/Partner of the business in order to apply, no exceptions.\*\*\*\*

A detailed written description of your work experience, including "hands on" tasks performed by you while working in the trade for which you wish to be licensed,
You MUST provide documented proof of five (5) of the last ten (10) years of employment by a licensed employer in the field for which you are applying for a license. [This can be verified by: •W2 Forms. Signed and dated copies of 1040 Federal income tax forms. (Only the first 2 pages are necessary.) • IRS wage form IT-2 (optional)]
Copies of diplomas and/or certificates of full time completed courses. (Partial credit for up to one year for completed courses)
NOTE: DO NOT black out income wages, paperwork will not be accepted. Any information provided on the application MUST match the provided income documentation. *DO NOT submit joint tax paperwork.
Provide 5 years of trade invoices when selecting endorsements number 9 and 10.
Have the "Verification of Employment" form, signed, and notarized by your most present or former employer(s), attesting to your employment. Verification of Employment is MANDATORY, no exceptions.
Complete the Affirmation form. You must select "A" OR "B", not both. Complete the form and sign it. This form does not have to be notarized.
All applicants for the Suffolk County Occupational Licenses MUST complete the entire application.
Any "YES" answer on the "Background Information Form" MUST be accompanied by a detailed explanation. Legal documented proof is required, IE: Resolution, appropriate disposition, and discharge of an obligation.
All documentation submitted must be a copy. Submitted documents will not be returned, nor will a copy be made.
